Book Launch: Who owns China's land and housing?

In less than two decades, China's real estate underwent an economic explosion. Real estate has pushed forward an unprecedented urbanization, driving up housing prices to levels never imagined, and leading to an affluent elite owning multiple properties. Few realize that the ownership structure for land and housing was critical in propelling the Chinese boom.

At the same time, the structure is becoming a major problem – its ambiguity leads to risks, speculation, evictions, urban sprawl, and a growing divide between rich and poor. In this context, the Chinese state has taken the decision to set up a fundamental institution: a registry that brings together all data over space and land, that what is on top of it, and beneath.

Though ambitious in scale and novel in design, the establishment of a land registry has met with considerable obstruction due to an unsolved question: Who owns the land and housing? In light of revolutionary land reforms and expropriations for property development, it should not be a surprise that the question is extremely difficult to answer. In this lecture, Prof. Peter Ho presented his new book *Unmaking China's Development* (Cambridge University Press, 2017) that *does* provide the answer...
